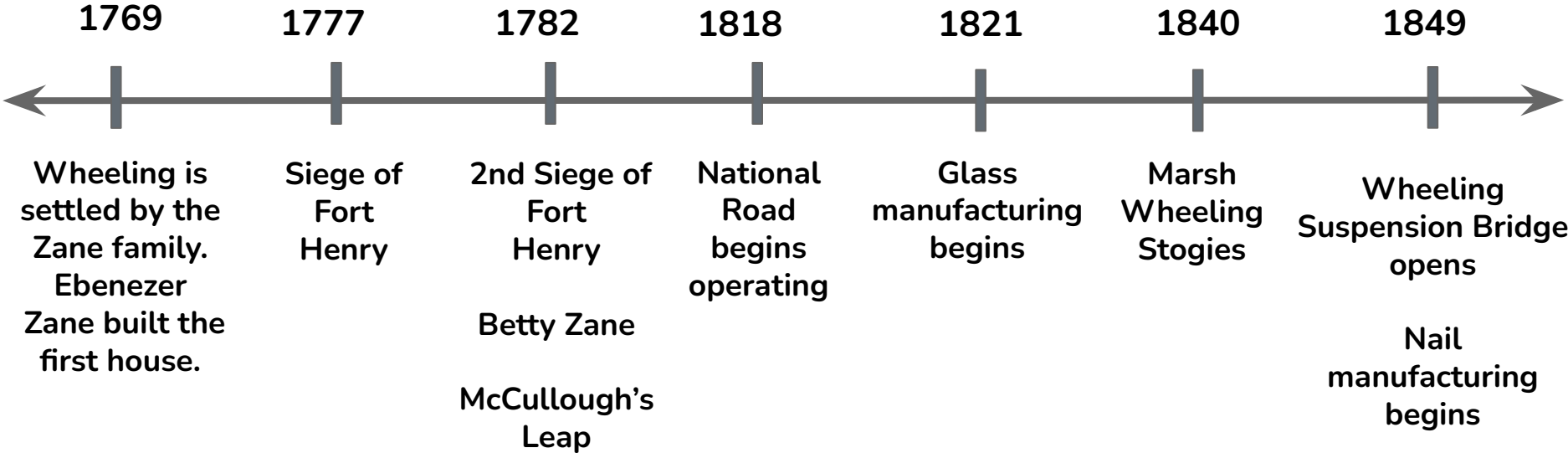

How did Wheeling get its name?

The name Wheeling supposedly is derived from a Delaware Indian “weelunk” meaning “head” or “skull,” a reference to the beheading of a party of settlers.

Indians.

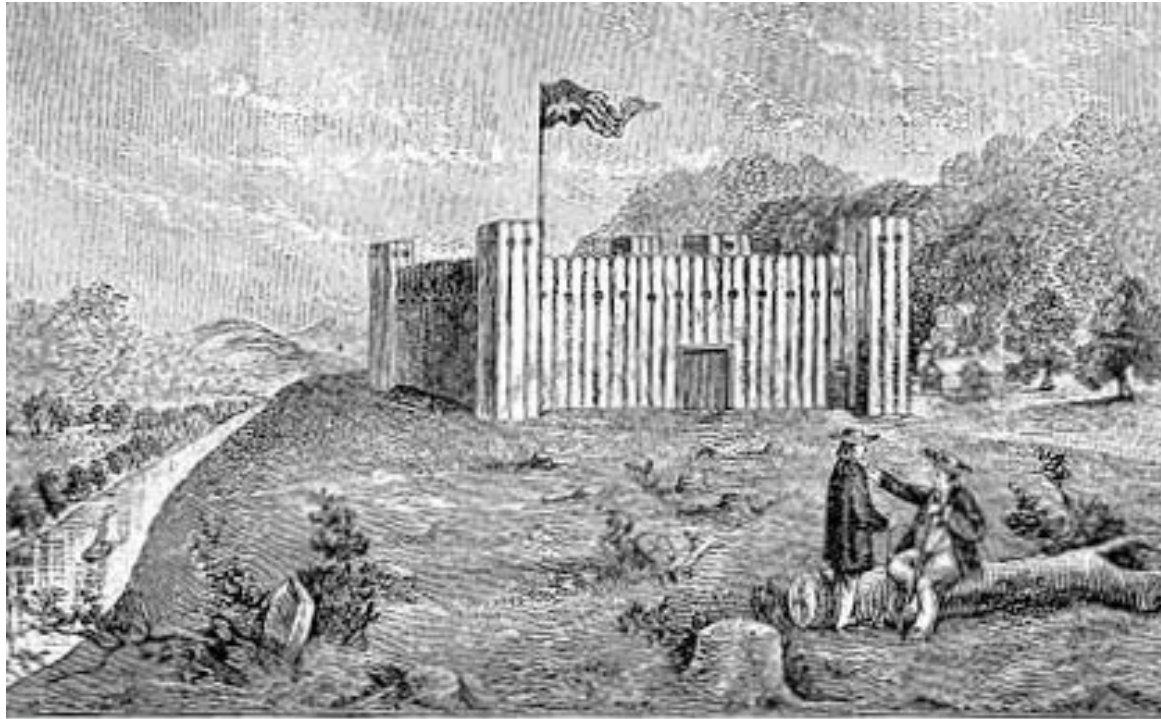

Fort Fincastle, built in 1774, later named “Fort Henry”

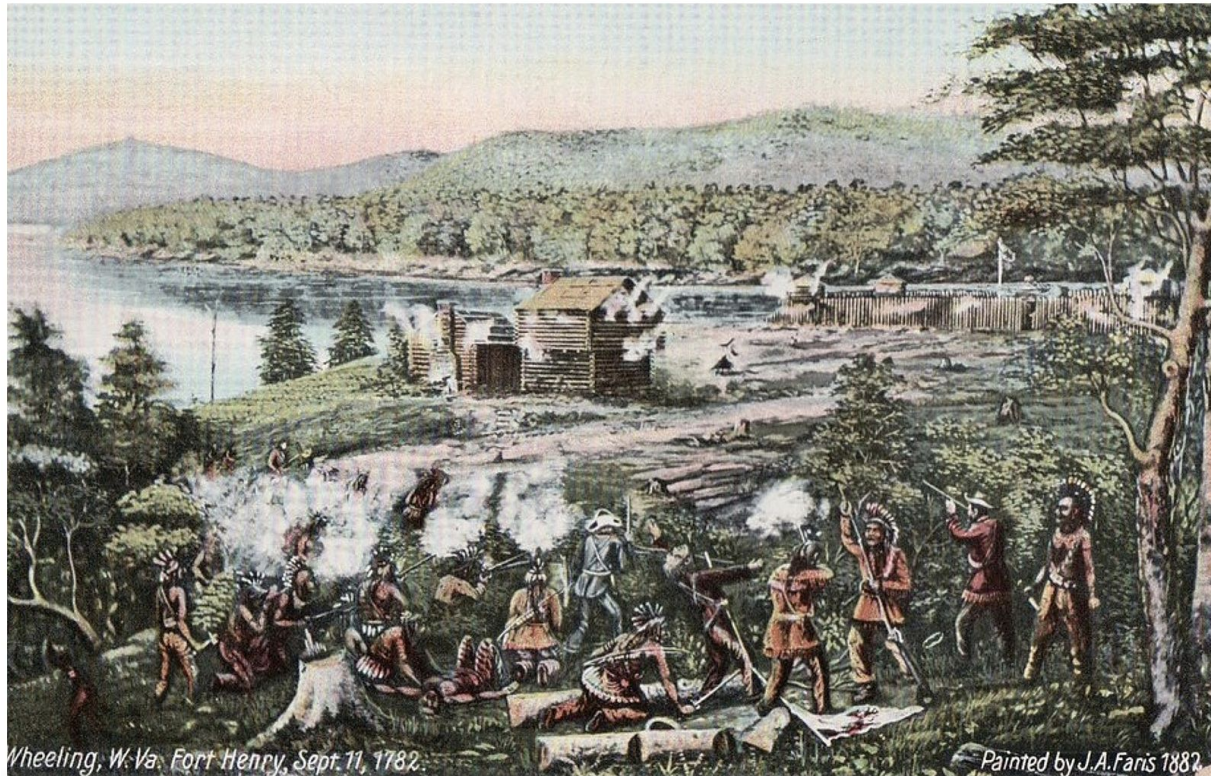


Siege of Fort Henry, 1777

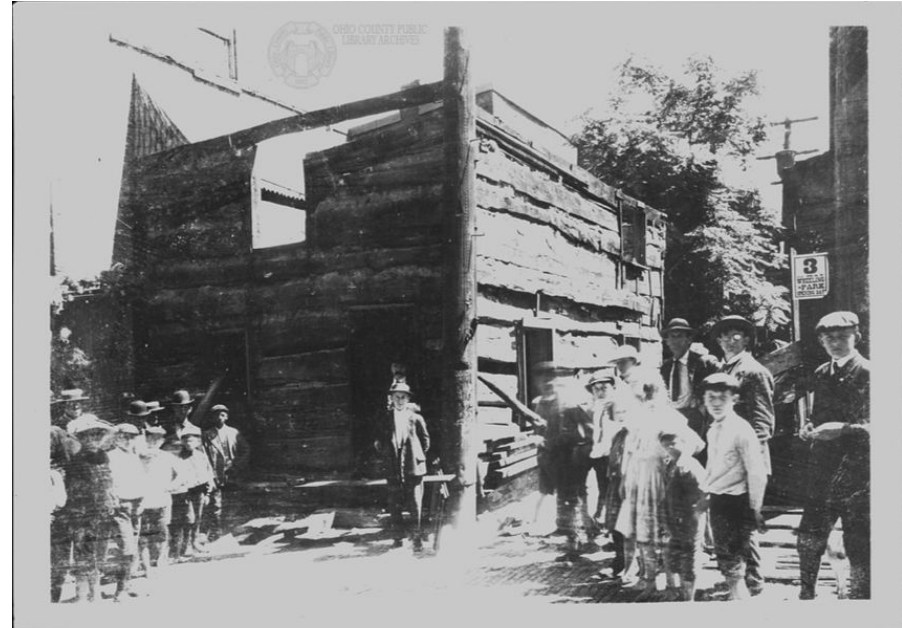

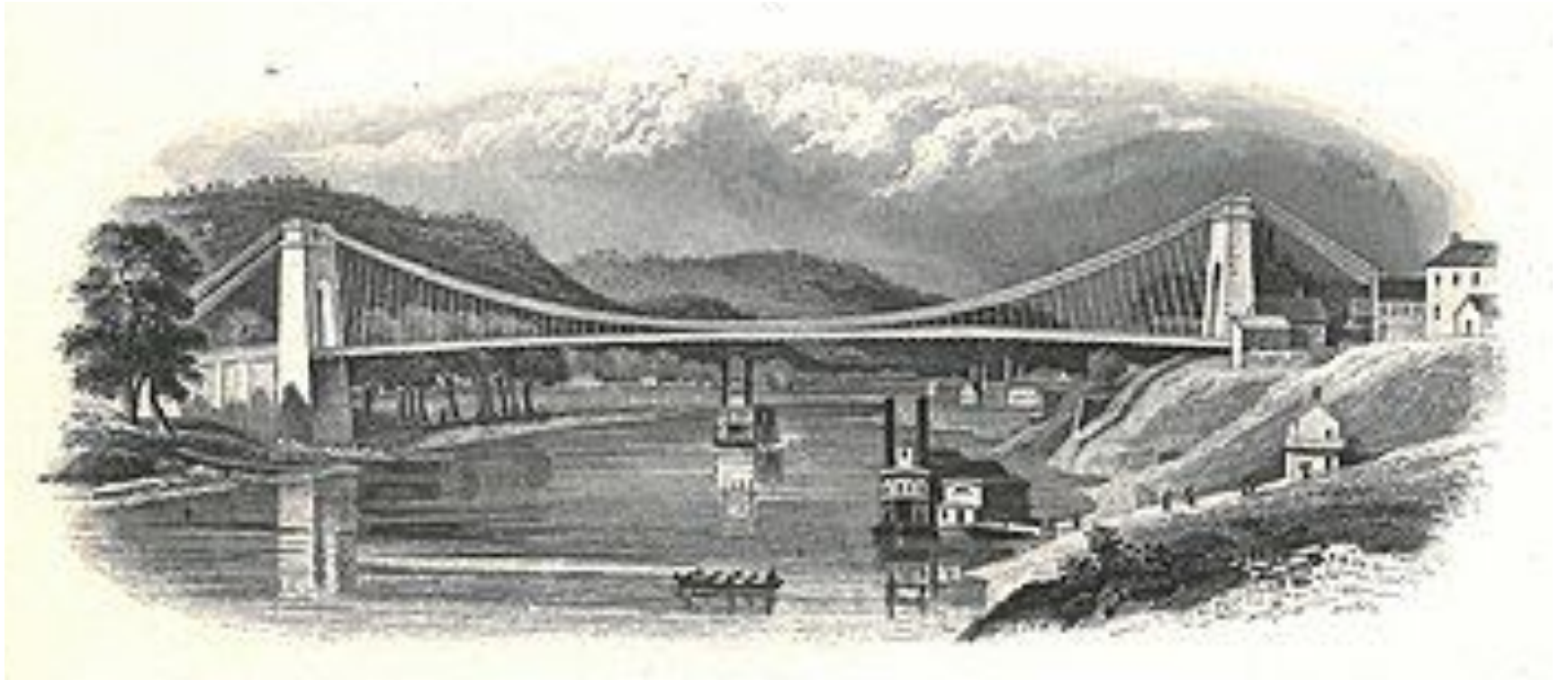
